Dear Parents and Carers,

We would like to thank you for giving us some feedback around our enrichment offer at West Thornton. As a school, and as part of Inspire Partnership, we are wholly committed to providing memorable learning experiences for our children both in and out of the classroom. We regularly review our offer and make changes year on year to make learning as engaging as it can possibly be, wherever it happens. For your information, leaders and teachers are working with colleagues across our Croydon Hub to create an overview of our trips and visits to share with you, so that you can quickly see the educational visits and visitors that are planned to support learning across our curriculum. For now, let us tell you about some of the exciting things that have happened in the last week alone!!

As you can see from the picture below - Year 4 had some very knowledgeable visitors - The Romans! Children spent a whole day being fully immersed in this historical period through a number of hands-on activities such as re-enacting battles and participating in a Roman Feast! The wide range of artefacts and dressing up made sure that whilst we gained new knowledge and developed our historical enquiry skills, we also had lots of fun!

In Reception, children were joined by Ranger Stu. It was an opportunity for children from both sites to come together as they learned about different types of animals as part of Understanding the World. Children were very brave when they were introduced to Coconut the Tarantula and also enjoyed meeting Rambo the bearded dragon, Reggie the python and Vincent the armadillo.







In the last week there has also been a fascinating visit to our local Hindu Temple, and today Year 6 attended a workshop led by Transport for London. After the half term break, Year 2 will be visiting ZSL London Zoo to help prepare them for writing a balanced argument about whether animals should be kept in captivity or not. Year 3 will descend into the dark depths of Chislehurst Caves!

Please do let us know if you have any other ideas for enrichment activities - above all we'd like any experts in our parent community to come into classes and share your knowledge, skills and viewpoints on our upcoming topics. In 2023, World Book Day is celebrating its 26th Anniversary and is sharing the message to all children '**you are a reader**'! At West Thornton, we will be using this special day to continue to promote reading for pleasure.



We would like to celebrate this wonderful day once more and to do so, children can do any of the following:

- ★ dress up as their favourite book character
- ★ wear their pyjamas and bring along their favourite bedtime story
- ★ bring in their favourite book
- ★ design a poster that shows their favourite book or author



During the day we will also be planning activities that will allow your children to get excited about their favourite books, hear some of the teacher's favourite stories and ensure there is time to share stories with their friends.

Curriculum Focus

Reception

In Reception this week the children enjoyed a visit from Ranger Stu, who brought their learning about wild animals to life. They bravely handled a variety of exotic creatures, including snakes, lizards, tarantulas and an armadillo. They listened carefully to important facts about the animals' natural environment, their feeding habits and how to care for them in captivity. This rich experience supported their publishing of fact files about both animals and their habitats.







In Literacy this week, the children applied their knowledge of what a good sentence looks like, using a writers toolkit to help them remember their capital letters, finger spaces and full stops. They also learnt the importance of editing.



In maths, the children have been learning about greater than and less than. They have used this knowledge to help them order numbers represented in different ways and have had the opportunity to revisit to place value. The children have been able to problem solve and prove answers to a problem by using a variety of manipulatives including cubes.numicon and counters.

In topic this week, the children have been producing their art outcomes, using their knowledge of printing and texture to create leaf prints using wax crayons and a watercolour wash, referring back to prior learning about the work of Birgit Koopsen as an inspiration. The children have also been introduced to the concept of Life Cycles, looking at caterpillars and butterflies and flowering plants.

Year One

This week in English we have been innovating the story "The Paper Bag Princess." The children started by thinking of different tasks for princess Elizabeth to command the dragon to complete to tire him out. The children came up with some very interesting ideas, such as flying the sky for twenty four hours or writing five story books. To make their writing more expressive the word "said" was banned and the children had to include synonyms such as yelled, shouted, whispered and mumbled.

In Maths this week the children in year 1 have continued to explore the number system. During the week they sorted numbers into odd and even, this helped them with the next step in their learning as they learnt how to count in 2's from 1 to 50. The week ended with the children counting in 10's from 1 to 50.

As part of our curriculum learning the children continued to learn about Hindu festivals. This week the children read about the Hindu celebration of Diwali known as the festival of light. The children learnt that as part of the celebration Hindu's decorate their front doors with Rangoli patterns to welcome in the Goddess Lakshmi.





Year Two

This week in Year 2 the children have produced some amazing independent writing outcomes. They have written their own persuasive letter to the thief who broke into our classroom at the beginning of term to persuade them to return their precious Christmas presents which were stolen. The children have focussed on including a range of literary devices including alliteration, emphasis, descriptive language and suffixes. We are extremely proud of what they have achieved.

In maths, the children have continued learning about Fractions. This week we have been focusing on equivalent fractions and finding fractions of an amount. The children have applied their knowledge of division to help them.

Within the wider curriculum, children have been learning about why exercise is important for our bodies in Science and made predictions about what they think will happen to our bodies when we perform a series of exercises. In art the children have been printing, using rollers and ink to create symbols detailing children's rights. The children will be using these prints to create posters for our final outcomes sharing their opinion of the Rights of a Child.

Year Three

It has been another exciting week in Year 3 full of interesting knowledge that the children have enjoyed learning. In maths the children have worked hard and showed great effort and motivation towards their understanding of division. The children have realised the importance of learning their times tables to be able to follow any method of division. Please work with your child

In the wider curriculum subjects, the children's Bologan patterns in Art have taken shape and are nearly complete. In science the children have reflected on their learning on the topic of rocks. They used their knowledge organisers to reflect on their learning journey. Well done Year 3 on their progress this half term!

Year Four

This week in year 4 has been an incredibly exciting one! The children visited a Hindu temple in line with their learning around Hinduism. The children were given the opportunity to learn about religious celebrations and how Hindu's worship in a temple. They watched a performance using traditional instruments and were given a tour around the temple.





In relation to their history topic this half term, the children had a Roman day at school! The children and staff made a great effort with their costumes. They had a range of roman related activities such as shield making, created mosaic plates, answered maths questions written in roman numerals and watched an episode of horrible histories whilst enjoying their snacks. Each class had the opportunity to be part of an interactive Roman workshop where they learnt how to be a Roman soldier, how to win in a battle as well as some key words in latin!

In English this week the children have been focussing on how to improve their writing skills by looking at linguistic devices to engage a reader in a creative piece of writing based on a picture prompt.

In Maths, year 4 have consolidated their knowledge of working out the area and applied this knowledge to real life by becoming surveyor's and designing a Roman base camp.

Year Five

This week, year 5, have worked tremendously hard; publishing their narrative of The Windrush Child and completing their sculptures inspired by Basil Watson windrush sculpture that's situated at Waterloo Station.

Children have collaborated in both Art and English to critique each other's pieces of writing and sculptures by sharing next steps to improve their final pieces.





Children are extremely proud of what they've produced and are excited to see their work displayed next half term, which you should be able to view at parents' evening.

In Maths children have continued to develop their knowledge of fractions and finding a fraction of a quantity using manipulatives, bar models and part whole modes to represent their calculations.

Year Six

This week in Year 6, the children have been able to showcase their understanding of WW2 and their writing skills by starting a narrative based upon children being evacuated. They have been able to practise using cohesive devices within their writing to ensure it flows and choosing elements to 'zoom in' on and describe in detail. They were able to focus not only on the emotions that the evacuees had, but the emotions on those around them as well in order to make it an engaging and thought provoking piece.

Additionally, the children have begun their learning of algebra in Maths. They have shown our values of resilience and excellence when understanding the use of formulating expressions. The use of extending their knowledge of the four operations into formulas has been an exciting challenge for them.

One exciting part of the week was when all the Year 6 classes joined up at Rosecourt Road to listen to a TfL workshop. This exciting opportunity taught them about being safe when travelling to and from school next year.
