Curriculum Focus

Reception

This week in English, the children have been practising understanding and following instructions. To begin with, the children grew their own cress plant and verbally practised saying the instructions. They have learnt about imperative verbs and know that to give an instruction there must be a bossy word! The children then practised writing their instructions, using numbered steps or time adverbials, such as first, then, next and finally.



In maths the children have been working on their addition skills. First, they practised their practical addition to recall the knowledge they already had. They then added to these skills to add two single digits by counting on. The children then counted out cubes to represent each number and counted on from the first number to find the total. The children extended their learning and recorded the number sentences in their books.

In the wider curriculum the children learnt about the lifecycle of a plant, continued to look at different weathers and how they differ in each season. The children were particularly excited that



it snowed towards the end of the week and it was lovely to see them apply some of their knowledge when talking about the weather. In DT the children have been testing suitable materials for our Reception Project to build a bug hotel. They

have identified and named different materials and sorted each

item by property. Additionally, as part of our topic learning about people and communities we discussed the celebration of Easter and Eid. We were fortunate enough to have a parent volunteer who came in to do some henna patterns on the children's hands.




This week in English, the children have been really busy writing their innovated part of their stories of our core text 'Grandads Island'. They have spent their time applying skills they have been working on and created some beautiful writing. The children have also been learning how to carefully edit and make improvements to their work.

In maths this week, the children have been continuing their learning about measure and focussing on mass. They have been using balance scales and identifying items which are heavier or lighter. The children compared objects before measuring and estimating which item would be the heaviest or lightest.

In History, the children continued their learning about the government by learning about the Prime Minister and elections. The children listened to children who wanted to nominate themselves to become the class Prime Minister and then voted for who they thought was the best candidate.

Year Two



This week in English, Year 2 has continued to work with our core text Frog Belly Rat Bone. On Tuesday, the students were very excited to design their own monsters using recycled materials. The monsters turned out amazing and the students worked hard to make each monster unique! They also had a chance to name their monsters and write about their creations in their writing books. They used their knowledge of the core text to produce some amazing pieces of writing, using interesting vocabulary to uplevel their work.

In Maths, the students were very excited to start a new unit on measurement. Year 2 had the opportunity to









work with measuring tapes and scales to measure the length of different objects around the classroom. Some even measured the full length of the classroom! Students learned how to use a ruler to measure and enjoyed learning about when to use metres or centimetres to accurately measure objects.

In History, the students continued to learn about the Jebb sisters and the amazing work they did to help the local community. The students had the opportunity to work together to create a timeline of the sisters lives and discussed why the sisters were significant individuals.

Year Three

This week in year 3 the children have been extremely busy. In English the children identified the features needed to produce a balanced argument. They then worked collaboratively to generate for and against statements for deforestation. They used a range of features to hook the reader in the introduction and began writing their first paragraph.

In Maths the children continued their learning of Fractions. They started the week comparing non unit fractions. The children had to practise and learn the different rules for comparing fractions. Later in the week they looked at identifying fractions on a scale and they had a go at drawing their own scales to show different fractions.

In curriculum Year 3 have enjoyed discovering the how and why animals including humans make food. In Geography the children looked at the satellite view of the rainforests and formed discussions around the effects of deforestation. Another one of the year 3 classes got their chance to go to Chislehurst caves which was very exciting.

Year Four

In Maths this week the children have been building on their fraction learning from last week to find out about improper fractions and mixed numbers. They have also started learning to compare fractions by putting them in ascending and descending order and spotting patterns in sequences of fractions.



The children have been writing amazing narratives using a mysterious wooden box as a central feature in English this week. They have used a




wide variety of literary devices to make their writing more interesting for the reader including adjectives, similes, metaphors, and personification, fronted adverbials, alliteration and hyperbole! All this while making sure they are punctuating their work accurately and sticking to the past tense. Great work Year 4.



In science this term the children are learning about how sound works and this week started to explore the difference between volume and pitch. Over the weeks the children have been experimenting with vibrations on a drum, how a simple telephone made with cups and string works and exploring the different pitches of notes on a xylophone.

Year Five



This week was assessment week across West Thornton Primary School and the children in Year 5 took the advantage to show off their previous learning in Maths, Writing and Reading - We were most impressed with the progress made!!



We still managed to achieve some new learning, particularly in the non-core subjects: in Science children explored forces, focusing on friction and Gravity. In the carousel of activities (rolling a ball along the floor; pushing a box along the floor; dropping a piece of A4 paper from a height; setting a car off both on the floor and the table and comparing the movements) they answered questions such as what forces are in action? What caused the object to slow down/ speed up and they had to record their answer using scientific language.



In RE we continued our learning and understanding about Buddhism, in particular the meaning of some of the Buddhist symbols. Test and ask your child/ren what the following symbols mean.














In DT, Year 5 continued planning their model of a rubber band car, making sure they labelled the parts and outlining the materials, key features and equipment necessary to make their intention.

Year Six

In English this week the children have thoroughly enjoyed writing poems based on gas masks to

link with the topic of World War 2. To ensure that their writing was powerful and enticing they included examples of figurative language such as similes, metaphors and personification. They included other devices such as alliteration, onomatopoeia, repetition, rhyme and hyperbole. They produced fantastic poems, well done Year 6!





Before the week ended the children began looking at and analysing the film, 'El Caminante' in preparation for our writing next week.

In Maths this week the children worked really well to calculate the area and perimeter of rectilinear shapes, before moving on to calculating the area of triangles, then parallelograms.

In Science this week, the children had great fun in learning how shadows are formed, they investigated how light affects the size and shape of a shadow.
