Curriculum Focus

Reception



This week in reception, the children have been learning a new story; The Gingerbread Man. In literacy the children have been learning to retell the story using a story map and using actions. They have been recalling actions from the previous week, such as 'Once upon a time' and 'Next', The children have also been immersed in their story as they made their own gingerbread men!



In maths, the children have learnt how to create their own repeating patterns. They first looked at different types of pattern that they might see, such as spotty patterns, flower patterns and checked patterns. They used this knowledge to make a two colour repeating pattern and then used their body to make different patterns, such as 'clap, stamp, clap, stamp'. They finished the



week by looking at different patterns and spotting the mistake. They used their new knowledge to then correct the pattern.

In the provision, the children have been exploring different activities related to The Gingerbread Man. They have been rolling playdough and using gingerbread man cutters, making gingerbread man collages and even using the small world area to retell the story.

Year One

This week in English, the children have been using their story maps to continue writing the story of 'The Lonely Beast'. They have been working on applying suffixes to create past tense verbs, using adjectives to add more detail to their writing and using conjunctions to extend sentences.

In maths, the children have been learning about ordinal numbers and how these are used in daily life. They worked together to order people in races and match the words to the numeral. The





children then used their knowledge of ordinal numbers to answer questions about positions.

In science this week, the children have designed a boat for a character in our core text 'The Lonely Beast'. They used their knowledge of materials and their properties to think about which material would be best and why. In computing, the children have been continuing their mouse and keyboard skills to save, then open and edit a file they have been working on.

Quick note

The children will be making boats next week in their science lesson and need some plastic bottles. If you have any spare **bottles** and spare **shoeboxes** at home then please could you bring them in, it would be much appreciated.

Year Two

This week in Year Two the children have been continuing to write their diary entries based on our English core text 'Izzy Gizmo'. The children have been generating time adverbials, emotion words and adjectives to make their writing interesting and engaging. They have also included exclamatory sentences to show feelings of joy and excitement! In Maths the children have been learning to make connections between their number bonds to ten and twenty by creating fact families. They have also learnt what happens to a single digit number when it becomes ten times bigger and enjoyed finding the missing number on the counting stick. In Science the children have been considering which material is best to make a raincoat for Paddington bear who recently fell into a bathtub of



water! The children worked collaboratively to carry out a fair test of the absorbency of materials and evaluated them. They then compared the results to the prediction they had made at the beginning of their learning journey.

Year Three

This week in Year 3 the children planned and started writing their autobiographies with interesting details and events from their lives. The children enjoyed sharing their important life experiences with their classmates and using interesting adjectives to describe their family, hobbies and interests. This writing activity has helped build our classroom communities as we have learned more about each other while also improving writing skills.

In Maths this week the children have continued their work with addition and subtraction. They enjoyed learning how to add 1s across 10 and then 10s across 100. The children have consistently



demonstrated their understanding of number bonds to 10 this week. Additionally, the children have also become more confident with using manipulatives to assist them in answering difficult questions.

In History, the children were taken back to Ancient Egypt to explore the inside chambers and passageways of the Pyramid of Giza. They enjoyed learning about the secret passageways and trap doors that were hidden within the pyramid. They also made connections to their previous learning when they made papyrus paper by exploring the hieroglyphics on the inside walls of the pyramid.

Year Four

This week in English, children worked hard to create and punctuate dialogue, as we continue to write our narrative story based on 'The girl who met an elephant' by Nizrana Farook. We've discussed parts of a story, and acted out sections to put ourselves into the shoes of the characters; we have worked on a range of figurative language such as metaphors and personification, in order to bring our writing to life.

During Maths we have started to subtract three and four digit numbers, from no exchange to two exchanges. We have discussed the nature of the subtraction number sentences, and have made the discovery that they are not commutative. We've used deines and counters to visualise and understand how to exchange, and have worked out our answers using the column method.

For the wider curriculum subjects, we have looked at real Jewish artefacts in RE, such as a sedar plate and a tallit, as well as researching Jewish festivals. We have created our own classification keys for science, and in geography we have been discussing the impact of physical geography on human geography. For art, we are creating a background in Jill Pelto's style to highlight worldwide issues with an emotional link.

Year Five

This week in Year Five, we have worked incredibly hard to write a play script based on our core text 'The Boy and the Globe'. They have learnt how to embed different structural features like the colon, brackets, and commas, and a variety of language devices to make it engaging for an audience.



In Maths children have continued to work hard on solving addition and subtraction problems and using inverse to check answers.





Within our Art lessons, children are now completing their final outcomes and incorporating different techniques to make it more effective. The children have also enjoyed developing their scientific knowledge on flowers and plants.

Year Six


This week in Year 6, the children have been consolidating their multiplication knowledge to the long multiplication method. They worked hard to ensure that each (of the many!) steps were worked out carefully and accurately so that their answers were correct. It was great to see them laying out their working out clearly in order to be successful.


They have also enjoyed jumping into the role of a journalist where they have been writing a newspaper report on a 'groundbreaking surgery'. They have ensured to remain formal throughout their piece and used skills such as direct and reported speech, relative clauses and reference chains.
