Curriculum Focus

Reception

This week in reception, the children have been continuing to learn about habitats. In literacy, they



have been looking at the habitats found in Wandle Park and have been comparing them to other habitats, such as the desert and the arctic. They have been writing the differences between the two habitats in full sentences such as 'It is hot.' and 'It is cold.' In the creative area, the children have been collaging their own habitats, such as rainforest and the desert. They have been using these to discuss the differences and similarities.

In maths the children have been learning about time. They have been understanding what a second is and have been challenged to complete as many activities as possible in a set amount of time. The children did 10 star jumps in 10 seconds and did 25 in 20 seconds! They discussed why they were able to complete more in a longer period of time. They also looked at the days of the week and placed them in the correct order and used time openers to describe their daily routine.



In topic this week, reception have been discussing the past and present using story books. They have read Goldilocks and the Three Bears and Jack and the Beanstalk and discussed the characters feelings as certain points of the story. They then used comparative language to compare the two feelings.

Year One

This week in English, the children have been so busy writing a recount of their trip to the Tower of London. They have been applying skills such as time adverbials, past tense and emotive language to retell their day.

In maths, the children have been continuing their learning of making number bonds to 20 using dienes and Numicon. They then used this to draw the tens and ones. They finished the week by learning how to subtract and the correct mathematical vocabulary. They told





subtraction number stories and used 20 frames to solve subtraction number problems and equations.


In the wider curriculum, the children have been learning how to group animals in different ways. This week in Science, they learnt about animal nutrition and groups animals using a venn diagram if animals were herbivores, carnivores or omnivores. In art, the children carefully evaluated their crowns they designed and made over the half term.

Year Two

Final week of this term has been so much fun for the children in Year 2.

In English, the children were busy putting their editing skills to a test. They edited their newspaper reports from last week. They then wrote a recount of the core text Hermelin; focusing on writing in the first person. Children consolidated their learning on writing in the last tense and using first person pronouns.





In maths, the children continued their learning on multiplying and dividing using their knowledge of counting in 2s, 5s and 10s. The children have been using vocabulary specific to multiplying and dividing; multiple, product, multiplicand, multiplier. Later on in the week, children used bar models to understand more about the two operations.



In the wider curriculum, the children enjoyed completing their final art outcomes. They painted a landscape in the style of Sally Morgan. Proudly, the children added layering and texture to their fine artwork. They then used oil pastels to add lines and



patterns. In science and geography, the children have summarised their learning into a double page spread. In RE the children learnt

about the importance of special festivals in the religion Islam. They specifically learnt about Ramadan and Eid-ul-Fitr and linked their learning to festivals from other religions.



Year Three

The final week this term has been busy but fun for the children!

In English, the children finished writing their balanced arguments about Deforestation. They became editors and made adaptations to their work and improved their sentences to ensure that they had an impact on the reader. They included a wide range of topic vocabulary 'We must act now to save our planet or future generations will not see the beauty of nature that we do'.

In maths, the children continued their learning on measurement using their knowledge from last week to find equivalent lengths when working with centimetres and metres as well as millimetres.

In the wider curriculum, the children have completed their double page spreads to share their knowledge of deforestation. In science, the children got very competitive by taking part in an end of term Rocks quiz on the platform Kahoot. The children also completed their final art outcome of Amazonian art, creating a Bologan cloth.



Year Four

The children have had an amazing last week of term, showcasing all their incredible learning outcomes. In maths, the children have been consolidating their knowledge of calculating the perimeter of rectilinear shapes, and regular and irregular polygons, becoming more confident in finding efficiencies in their calculations. The children have extended their learning, to solving basic algebra, an exciting part of mathematics where symbols replace numbers and quantities. The children have demonstrated perseverance and resilience as they have problem-solved together, to develop maths mastery. In English this week, the children have been publishing their best writing from our core text, 'The Adventures of Odysseus'. They have demonstrated an increasing awareness of the reader through a variety of literary devices including 'show not tell', how to use engaging character dialogue, and they successfully used rich figurative language to paint vivid descriptions of the settings. Please do ask your child to explain or demonstrate 'show not tell' to













In art this week, the children have completed their Ancient Greek pots, painting them, and adding intricate designs. The children have enjoyed learning about the use of these vessels through both history and English lessons. In history, the children have completed a double-page spread in their books to answer their key assessment question, researching the rights and freedoms of the ancient Greeks. They enjoyed capturing their learning through infographics, drawn images, and writing short summaries of important aspects of Greek life including, the class system, voting rights, philosophers, and the legal system.

Year Five

Another jam packed week for Year 5! This week we have created our own chapter for our core text, Windrush Child. We used a

variety of literary devices such as repetition, short sentences and figurative language to continue the story.

In maths, we have moved on to fractions and have looked at how we multiply fractions by integers. We started by multiplying unit fractions, moved on to non-unit fractions and then went on to multiply mixed numbers by integers. We will continue this after half term and expand our knowledge further.

In science, we have planned an investigation to see how day and

night are created through the movement of the Earth. Unfortunately, the weather has not been on our side so we are going to have to wait for the sun to come out after half term in order to be able to carry out the investigation.



Our art work inspired by The National Windrush Monument by Basil Watson is close to being completed. We would love for you to come and see them during the planned art exhibition that will take place during parents' evening.




Finally, a huge thank you to all of the friends and family who have supported the children this half term. They have had some excellent experiences and have made great progress. This can only happen with everyone's support!

In Maths children have consolidated their learning on fractions, decimals and percentages - and have applied their knowledge of converting between FDP to solve various multi step problems-So please ensure children take their time to complete homework to check their understanding. In Writing, children have also written up their final pieces from the point of view of an evacuee and their experience of leaving London to go to the countryside. Within these pieces they have worked really hard to use ambitious vocabulary and a variety of punctuation to manipulate their sentences to be effective. In reading, children have been reading high quality texts and using the CLEAR strategies to answer SATs style questions. We would like thank all the families for attending our reading session yesterday and look forward to seeing many more of you in our SATs sessions for maths and SPAG in the next half term.
